Closing the Gender Gap

The divide between the performance of girls and boys is well documented and been going on in education for some time.

What we can all do to raise the achievement of boys

Avoid purchasing merchandise for boys that reinforces gender stereotypes e.g. t-shirts that have slogans like "Here comes trouble", "Boys will be boys".

Identify positive 'masculine' and 'feminine' traits and behaviours as positive 'human' behaviours.

Regularly reward academic success.

Get boys reading - if they say it's boring or they don't like it, persist because we just haven't found the thing that interests them yet.

Give them some independence and expect them to do more for themselves. Teach them how to do more for themselves. Boys are often significantly less independent than girls prior to starting school and differences in language development are evident right from the early years.

Talk to boys about their future and what will be expected and admirable

behaviours of a good father, business owner, boss, role model, etc.

Don't accept lower standards of behaviour from a boy than you might from a girl.

Talk to them and with them about their feelings, concerns, anxieties.
